MSc in Global China Studies

What's the program about?

Our interdisciplinary curriculum provides global and local perspectives on China's past and present. Taught by the best China Studies faculty in Asia, the program enables advanced undergraduates from elite universities to take on the challenge of postgraduate study, and receive both a Bachelor's and a Master's degree normally within 4 to 5 years. Competitive students can also qualify for overseas exchange opportunities in their second term of study.

How long does the program last?

Full-time: 1 year; Part-time: 2 years

Who is eligible to apply?

- You should have completed all your undergraduate coursework requirements with a CGA of 3.0 or higher
- You should possess an IELTS score of no lower than 7 (all sub-scores should be 6.5 or above), or a TOEFL score of no lower than 600 (PBT) or 100 (IBT), if your first language is not English
- You should have obtained a bachelor's degree, or its equivalent, from a recognized university, or the endorsement of designated partner universities with HKUST

What pathway do you belong to?

- Pathway "4+1": Individual applicants satisfying the general admission requirements can apply directly to the program as regular applicants for taught postgraduate programs
- Pathway "3+1": Recommended by our partner universities, non-local undergraduate students in their third year at the time of the application can apply for early admission into the program
- Pathway "1+x": Recommended by our partner universities, non-local postgraduate students completing their first year at the time of the application can apply and spend a year in the MSc in Global China Studies program

How much does it cost?

HK \$ 5.000 for each additional credit

HK \$ 120,000 for the entire program (8 courses), and

How to graduate?

Students are required to complete 24 credits of course-work, including three core courses (3 credits each)*, one course devoted to academic writing (3 credits), and four GCS elective courses (3 credits each)* which cover no less than two of four subject areas.
