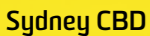

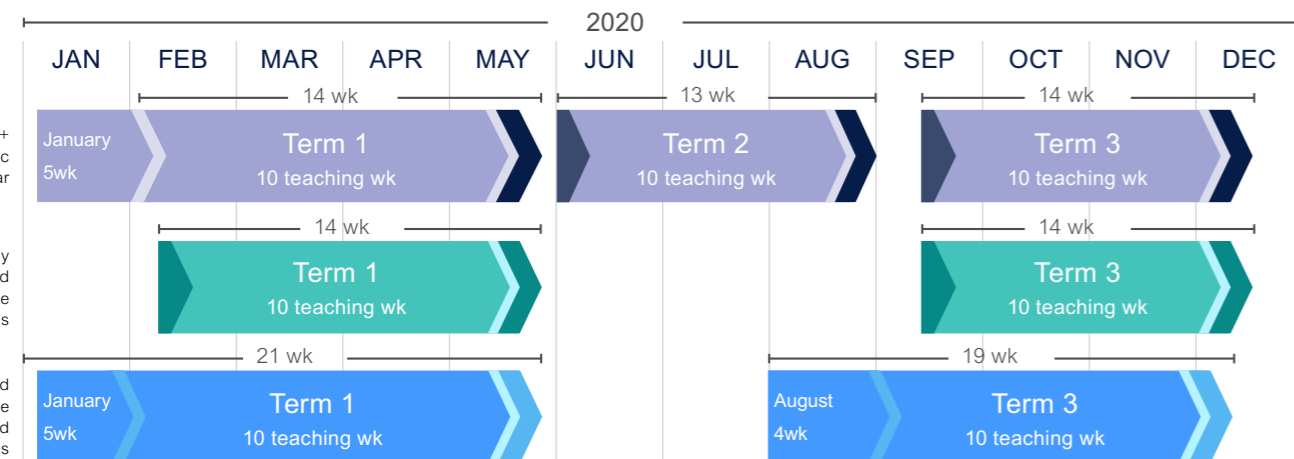


UNSW3+

Our innovative academic calendar, called UNSW3+, gives students amazing flexibility. It better aligns with university calendars across the world to help students study at UNSW for either a semester-long or year-long experience.

Flexible study plans

UNSW has an innovative academic calendar, called UNSW3+, which gives students amazing flexibility. It features three 10-week terms per year plus a 5-week term in January and/or August. UNSW3+ better aligns with university calendars in the Northern Hemisphere, eliminating overlap between the Australian terms and the Northern Hemisphere summer. This is great news for students wanting to study at UNSW for either a semester-long or year-long experience.



**Tailored Terms include examination period

With a full time academic load remaining at 8 courses per year, students will have the option of electing to take 3 courses during a regular term or 4 courses during a tailored term.

Tailor your Term

As a comprehensive, research-intensive university, UNSW Sydney offers hundreds of courses across nine academic faculties during our terms and tailored terms.

Most of these are open to study abroad and exchange students. While students are encouraged to independently research course options, the following academic tracks may help focus course selections in your specific area of study.

These tracks are intended as a helpful guide and are not prescriptive. Students from the areas of studies listed below are welcome to research and enrol in courses outside of these courses.

Design your timetable

1. Select your core courses

Explore the full list of courses in the UNSW Sydney Online Handbook. Browse the suggested academic pathways to assist your selection. While every student's academic needs are different, most students take two core courses while studying at UNSW Sydney.

2. Select your elective courses

Explore the UNSW Sydney Online Handbook for our range of elective courses. The Australian Studies courses on page 19 are preapproved electives that offer a great way to learn about our diverse country and culture.

3. Submit your courses for Faculty approval

Once you decide which courses you are interested in, submit them for Faculty approval following the instructions provided by UNSW Sydney staff. Additional courses can be submitted for approval at a later date.



Academic tracks

Tailored Terms are for those students taking 24 UNSW Credits (30 ECTS), while the Term options are for students who require 18 UNSW Credits (22.5 ECTS). Students have the flexibility to build their Study Abroad and Exchange program based on the number of credits they need to transfer back to their home institution.

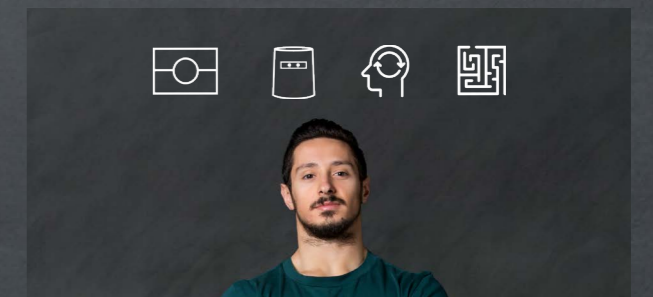

What you can study

Internships

UNSW Sydney Study Abroad offers some internship opportunities. The internships are weighted at six units of credit or one course and students are expected to enrol in another 12 – 18 units of credit to make up the fulltime study load. Contact our office for further information and application forms.

Entry requirements

A cumulative grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 grading scale - or equivalent standard from your home institution.

English requirements

You may be asked to provide evidence of your English proficiency to study at UNSW depending on your educational background and citizenship. See page 34 for details.

Enrolment requirements

18 UNSW Credits per Standard Term (Typically 3 courses) – equivalent to 22.5 ECTS

24 UNSW Credits per Tailored Term (Typically 4 courses) – equivalent to 30 ECTS

48 UNSW Credits per Year (Typically 8 courses) – equivalent to 60 ECTS

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Students are required to have OSHC for the duration of their student visa (except holders of Norwegian, Swedish and Belgium passports). Study Abroad will purchase OSHC on your behalf through Medibank Private.

Application process

1. Create profile

unsw.openacademies.com/registerforstudyabroad

2. Start application

Ensure that the name on your application is the same as on your passport. Make sure that you choose all the Terms that you want to study at UNSW for.

3. Submit application

Prepare the following documents as a pdf to submit with your application:

1. Your most recent official academic transcript (with English translation)
2. The ID page of your passport
3. Proof of English Language Proficiency if required (see page 34)

4. Choose courses

Choose courses that you wish to study while at UNSW and submit them for approval by UNSW. Check that the courses you wish to study are offered in the term you will be at UNSW and will be approved by your home institution.

5. Receive offer

If your application is successful you will receive an offer letter by email.

6. Accept offer

Accept your offer online and pay your deposit and/or OSHC fees if applicable.

7. Housing

If you want to apply for on-campus housing, apply as soon as you accept your offer.

8. Receive CoE and Apply for Visa

You will receive a confirmation of enrolment (CoE) after you accept your offer. This is required for your visa application.

9. Book flights

Ensure that you will arrive in time for our orientation program.

Internships

You need to be nominated by the Exchange Office at your home university.

English requirements

You may be asked to provide evidence of your English proficiency to study at UNSW depending on your educational background and citizenship. See page 34 for details.

Enrolment requirements

Standard Term: 18 UNSW Credits (Typically 3 courses) – equivalent to 22.5 ECTS

Tailored Term: 24 UNSW Credits (Typically 4 courses) – equivalent to 30 ECTS

Year Program: 48 UNSW Credits (Typically 8 courses) – equivalent to 60 ECTS

Tuition fees

You pay your usual tuition fees to your home university, not UNSW.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Students are required to have OSHC for the duration of their student visa (except holders of Norwegian, Swedish and Belgian passports). Details on how to purchase OSHC are provided on your acceptance.

Application process

1. Nomination

You need to be nominated by your home university, and they will choose one of our Study Plans for you. After being nominated, an email with application instructions and logon details will be sent to you.

2. Start application

Ensure in your application that your name is the same as on your passport.

3. Submit application

Prepare the following documents as a pdf to submit with your application:

- Your most recent official academic transcript (with English translation)
- The ID page of your passport
- Proof of English Language Proficiency if required (see page 34)

4. Choose courses

Choose courses that you wish to study while at UNSW, and submit them for prerequisite approval by UNSW. Check that the courses you wish to study are offered in the term you will be at UNSW and will be approved by your home institution.

5. Receive offer

If your application is successful you will receive an offer letter by email.

6. Accept offer

Accept your offer online.

7. Housing

If you want to apply for on-campus housing, apply as soon as you accept your offer. Details will be issued with your offer.

8. Purchase your OSHC

You will receive details about purchasing OSHC with your offer.

9. Receive CoE and Apply for Visa

You will receive a confirmation of enrolment (CoE) after you accept your offer and purchase OSHC. This is required for your visa application.

10. Book flights

Ensure that you will arrive in time for our orientation program.

Study Abroad Research Practicum

University students from anywhere in the world can come to UNSW through our Study Abroad Research Practicum for short-term research.

Study plans

There is flexibility in when you commence, with UNSW welcoming students weekly.

What you can study

You will create a research plan with your supervisor and home university before you arrive at UNSW. You will have access to services, libraries, campus amenities and liability insurance for UNSW premises.

UNSW's research focus includes the following areas:

- Biomedical Sciences
- Water, Climate, Environment and Sustainability
- Next Generation Materials and Technologies
- Social Policy, Government and Health Policy
- ICT, Robotics and Devices
- Law, Business and Economics
- Fundamental and Enabling Sciences
- Contemporary Humanities and Creative Arts
- Defence and Security

Entry requirements

A cumulative grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 grading scale - or equivalent standard from your home institution.

You also need to find an academic at UNSW who agrees to supervise your research.

English requirements

You may be asked to provide evidence of your English proficiency to study at UNSW depending on your educational background and citizenship. See page 34 for details.

Tuition fees

Tuition fees of A\$1,000 per term/4-month period.

One-off administration fee of A\$330.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Students are required to have OSHC for the duration of their student visa (except holders of Norwegian, Swedish and Belgian passports). Details on how to purchase OSHC are provided on your acceptance.

Application process

1. Check you are eligible

You will need to ensure you meet the UNSW Entry and English Language requirements

2. Find a supervisor

Contact UNSW academics to find a suitable supervisor and negotiate start and finish dates for your practicum.

3. Nomination

The academic then emails practicum@unsw.edu.au with your full name, email address, host UNSW school and home university.

4. Application

UNSW will email you with details on how to fill in an online application.

5. Receive offer

If your application is successful you and your supervisor will receive an acceptance letter by email.

6. Purchase your health insurance

OSHC insurance is required if you are coming to UNSW on a student visa. Send the receipt to the Study Abroad Research Practicum Team.

7. Receive CoE and Apply for Visa

You will receive a confirmation of enrolment (CoE) after UNSW receives confirmation of your health insurance. This is required for your visa application. Make travel arrangements, book flights and accommodation once you receive your visa.

8. On arrival at UNSW

Ensure that you attend in-person to register your arrival at the Study Abroad and Exchange office before you start your research at UNSW. Contact us to find a suitable time.

UNSW campus is located in the Eastern Suburbs and many students choose to live by the beach in places such as Coogee, Bondi Beach, Clovelly or Maroubra; or instead find accommodation closer to the bustling city centre of Sydney and our iconic harbour.

Accommodation at UNSW Colleges

Colleges provide a choice of full-board, partly catered and self-catered style accommodation. There are male-only and female-only options, as well as mixed male and female accommodation. Most colleges cater for dietary requirements like halal, kosher and vegetarian.

Apartments

Apartments offer independent-style self-catering living for students. Costs vary depending on the number of rooms and the location.

Applications

Details on how to apply will be sent to students after they have been accepted into a Study Abroad or Exchange program. There is one application portal for all UNSW Accommodation options, but separate processes for the independent providers.

Off campus housing

UNSW Sydney is located in the Eastern Suburbs district with close proximity to some of the most beautiful beaches in Sydney, and a short distance by public transport to the Sydney city centre. Many Study Abroad & Exchange students live in the suburbs surround UNSW campus including Coogee Beach, Randwick, Kensington, Maroubra, or iconic Bondi.

Student accommodation providers

Sydney has several providers catering specially to students. Accommodation is located around Sydney - generally around 30-50 minutes from the UNSW Campus. These options offer high quality rooms with air conditioning and extra services. Options include Iglu, Urbanest and others.

Rental property

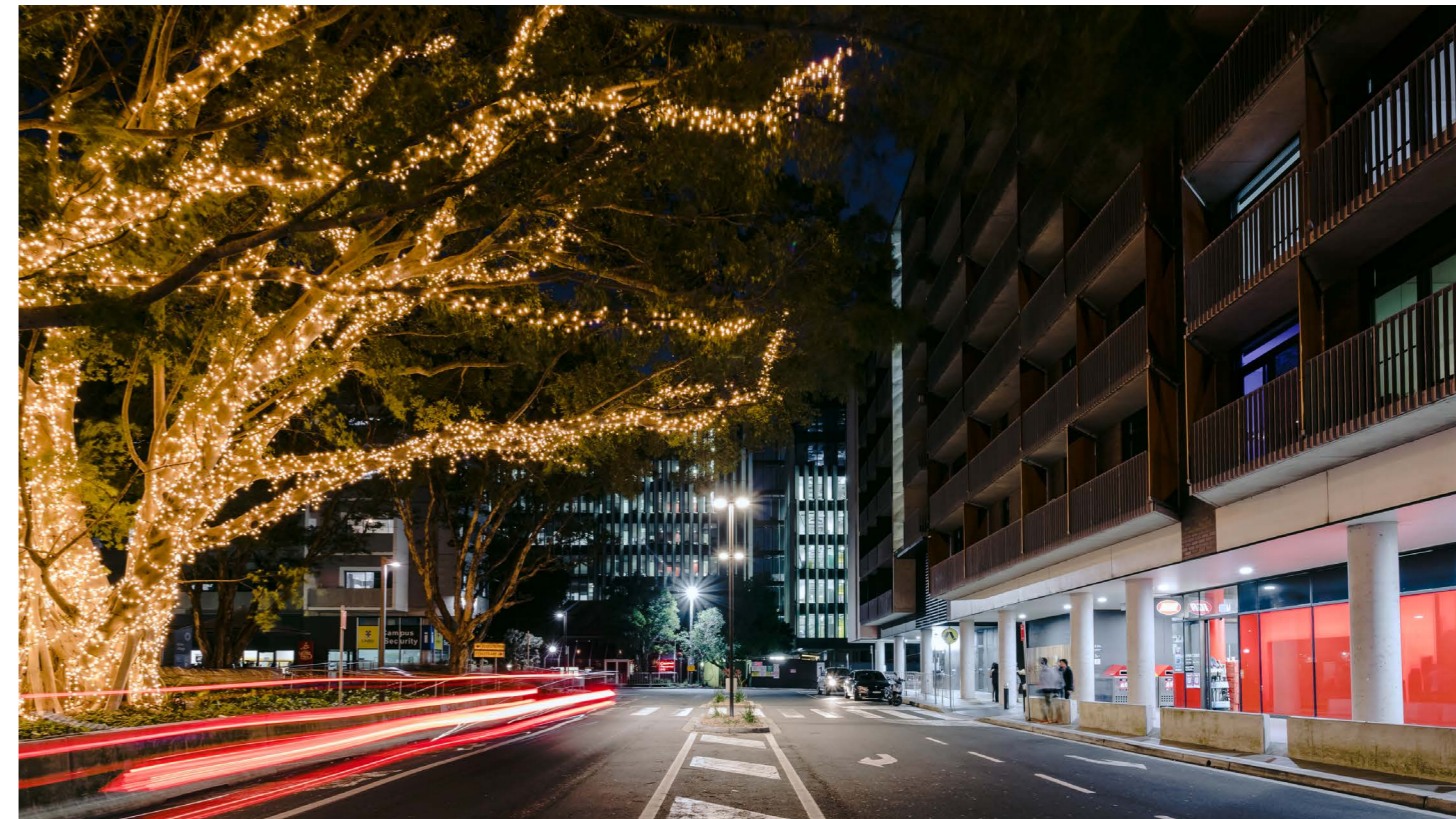
There are many private rental properties available in the suburbs surrounding UNSW Sydney. Costs vary according to the number of bedrooms, condition and location. When renting, you can expect to sign a six- or 12-month lease and pay rent in advance, plus a security deposit called a bond. Rental properties can be offered either furnished or unfurnished - and additional expenses like electricity, gas, telephone and Wi-Fi are typically not included in the rental price. Costs vary but usually range from A\$200 – A\$300 per student per week in a shared house or apartment. Please note that students should never arrange private off-campus accommodation nor transfer money from overseas. To ensure you are renting a property that is legitimate and secure, only commit to a lease/tenancy agreement if you have viewed the property in person.

Temporary accommodation

If you haven't confirmed your university accommodation before you arrive, we recommend you allow three to four weeks before classes begin to look for private housing to give you time to settle in and attend orientation sessions. Be sure to book short-term accommodation first, then look for long-term options in person. Short-term accommodation can include private hotels, motels, hostels, lodges or furnished apartments ranging from A\$45 to A\$300 per day.

Under 18s

Arrangements must be made for students under 18 years of age. These requirements are in line with Australian Government regulations for the care and welfare of international students under 18. student.unsw.edu.au/visa18
