Chinese enrollment at Israel universities on the rise

Deal proves growing strength of relationship between the two countries, University of Haifa says

The influx of Chinese students at Israeli universities has been growing steadily in recent years.

On the forefront of this enrollment boom is the University of Haifa, which currently boasts some 200 Chinese stu-

dents among its student body, com-pared to 20 in 2013, representing a 1,000% increase.

A majority of these students come from the University of East China Nor-mal University in Shanghai, which is a stete city of Haifs.

Robin welcomes the addition. "The Robin welcomes the addition. "The cooperation with strategic partners from Chinese industry and academia serves the strategic goals of the university," said Robin. "We have positioned ourselves as a leading international institution. As such, we welcome all the Chinese students to Israel, and intend to continue to deepen the tier and cooperation."

These ties can result in profitable research and development in which millions of dollars are currently being invested in the hopes to further strengthen the bonds between the two countries.

This past March, Prime Minister Ben-jamin Netanyahu and Economy Minis-ter Eli Cohen were present when Robin, along with the Hangzhou Wahaha Group and the Institute of Automation at the Chinese Academy of Sciences, signed a Stb. Minister of the Minister signed a \$10-million deal that finalized the construction of three Israeli-Chi-nese artificial intelligence technology centers in Haifa, Hangzhou and Beijing. According to the university, this deal

"proved the growing strength of the relationship between the two coun-

tries."

But the university insists that there's a lot in it for the students as well, saving that "the Chinese love Haifa's location that combines mountains and sea, and are very impressed by the city's large high-tech complex." And it's not just science-based cours-

And it's not just science-passed courses that are attracting the students to Haifa, according to a statement released by the university. "In general, Chinese students are particularly interested in the disciplines for which the Universithe disciplines for which the University of Haifa has developed unique programs: marttime studies, public health,
medical clowning, art therapy, education, national security studies and the
English-speaking Global Green MBA,
focusing on sustainability and ecological-friendly development – two of the
main economic challenges in China."

Across town, the Technion-Israel
Institute of Technology has also seen

Institute of Technology has also seen Institute of Technology has also seen an influx of Chinese students in recent years. During the 2016-2017 academic year, the school had 117 full-time Chinese students, and 177 Chinese students enrolled in its summer school of engi-

neering.

The Technion has been intensifying its academic cooperation with Chinese universities and students, and in 2013, together with Shantou University (STU), received a \$130m. grant from the Li Ka Shing Foundation to establish a branch of the Technion in the Guangdong Province. The Technion hailed the partnership

as "a new era of research and innova-tion in science, engineering and life sciences, an unprecedented coopera-tion between the People's Government of Guangdong Province and Shantou Municipal Government, Technion, and STIL'8"

The highly anticipated addition to the Technion is scheduled to open its doors in October. Some 240 students from several provinces in China have enrolled for study at the Technion branch, which offers three engineering programs: chemical, material science and biotechnology and food engineering, Preparatory studies begin this month and the first semester begins in October

The Zioness group had announced that it would join the annual demon-stration Saturday against sexual vio-lence to promote the idea that Zion-ism and progressive values are com-

patible. SlutWalk Chicago organizers said prior to the march that they did not support the Zioness initiative's par-

ticipation.

"SlutWalk Chicago does not support
the 'Zioness progressives' planning on
coming to the walk Saturday. We at
SlutWalk Chicago stand with Jewish
people, just as we stand for Palestinian human rights. Those two ideologies can exist in the same realm, and
taking a stance againgt antisemitism taking a stance against antisemitism

taking a stance against antisemitism is not an affirmation of support for the State of Israel and its occupation of Palestine," the group wrote on its Facebook page.

"We oppose all oppressive governments whether they be the United States or Israel, as we recognize these regimes often disproportionately oppress women and femmes. We find it disynstring that any group would appropriate a day dedicated to survivors fighting rape culture in order to promote their own nationalist agen-

da."

Accord-ing to reports, they carried signs depicting a woman wearing a Star of David necklace and in some cases wore rainbow-colored T-shirts embla-zoned with a Star of David. When

they waved their signs, other Slut-Walk participants blocked them from view with the red umbrellas they were carrying as a symbol of solidarity with sex workers.

At the end of the speeches, which concluded with a Palestinian activist telling the crowd "you cannot be a Zionist and feminist," the crowd began chanting "Free Palestine," the

Windy City Times reported.

Zioness participants and others dropped out during the march through downtown Chicago, according to the Windy City Times. The march reportedly started with about 150 women and ended with about 60.

In front of Trump Tower, marchers stopped to destroy a replica of US Presstopped to destroy a replica of US Press

stopped to destroy a replica of US President Donald Trump's head. Toward

the end of the march, some participants scuffled with police, leading five of them to be arrested.

Organizers of the SlutWalk initially said they would ban Stars of David from the event, but later altered their policy to allow religious symbols but


poincy to allow religious symbols but not national flags.

The SlutWalk policy came in the wake of a controversy over the Chica-go Dyke March in June, when three Jewish participants at the LGBTQ demonstration were ejected for carry-ing LGBTQ Pride flags adorned with the Star of David. Dyke March orga-nizers said the women were advocat-ing for Israel at an anti-Zionist event.

ing for Israel at an anti-Zionist event. On Friday, SlutWalk Chicago released a statement titled "Palestin-ian Rights are a Feminist Cause." "As a feminist, transnational move-ment calling for an end to rape culture, we march in solidarity with all Palestinians suffering the impact of the State of Israel's brutal policies. The reasons for this are simple. In the words of Linda Sarsour, one of the architects of the 2017 Women's March who also organized A Day Without a Woman, 'You either stand up for the rights of all women, including Palestinians, or none.' In a nutshell, women's rights are human rights,'

women's rights are human rights," the statement said.

"If the rights of Palestinians are degraded by the State of Israel's pol-icies across the whole territory they control – including the West Bank as well as Gaza, where Israel controls all entry and exit in this 10th year of military blockade – the treatment of Palestinian women is particularly of Palestinian women is particularly dehumanizing." Injured model's condition improves after e-bike accident

Growing injury toll for electric scooters during summer vacation

The medical condition of 23-year-old model Shlomit Malka, vho fell from her electric scooter on Sunday while riding down

Tel Aviv's Rothschild Boulevard, has improved significantly.
Malka arrived at Sourasky Medical Center's emergency room
in serious condition, was ventilated and put under anesthesia.
She woke on Monday, was pronounced in good condition and was transferred from the intensive care unit to a regular

and was transferred from the intensive care unit to a regular department.

Malka was not wearing a helmet while riding the scooter, even though it is required by law.

According to traffic safety organization Or Yarok, only 22% of riders of electric bicycles, scooters, hoverboards and other two-wheeled vehicles wear protective helmets, and many are below the 16-year-old age limit. In addition, most stores selling the vehicles fail to brief customers on age and safety limits as well as how to ride safely, even though they are required to do so, Or Yarok said. so, Or Yarok said.

Last year, 10 Israelis were killed while riding such vehicles.

A draft of the Declaration of Independence is not the property of the state and can be sold, the Jerusalem District Court ruled on Sunday In November 2015, the Kedem Auction House listed an April 27, 1948, draft of the

was legally state property. As such, the state claimed

that Baum's sons, Daniel and Refael, had no private prop-erty right to the draft, could not sell it and that it must be turned over to be placed in the National Archives.

Rejecting the state's arguments, Judge Tamar Bazak-Rann port wrote that

state property, Bazak-Rappa-port said there was no legal claim the state could make on drafts of the declaration if Mordechai had been a volun-

teer at the time.

In addition, though at a later date Mordechai did join the Justice Ministry, the court did not think that all drafts

was a state employee when he wrote the draft, this delay blocked the state from claiming the document was too historically significant to allow it be publicly auc

Finally, the court said that the state's fears of losing the document were exaggerated given that the sons had
