University Information	
General Information	<p>Founded in 1832, the University is the third oldest in England. Durham is a collegiate institution, with 16 Colleges which provide a social, domestic and pastoral focus for students, as well as University accommodation, if eligible. Ustinov College performs this role exclusively for postgraduate students. The University has long since grown beyond the historic centre of Durham to include a modern science site, student accommodation, libraries, and sports and social facilities. The University buildings are spread across the City on several sites within easy walking distance of each other. Teaching and Research are organised by the Academic</p>

	<p>Departments which are quite separate from the Colleges.</p> <p>The University has a total student population of about 16,000, nearly a quarter of those on postgraduate courses. The work of the University covers traditional areas of study/education, including key branches of science and technology. Durham graduates are in great demand among employers and the University helps to attract investment into the region. It provides training, short courses and expertise for industry, and through its cultural events, conferences and tourist business and as a major employer, the University contributes in a wide social and economic sense to the local community.</p>
Campuses	Durham has two main campuses, Durham City and Queen's Campus Stockton.

City and Regional Information	
Where is Durham?	<p>Durham University is a busy research and teaching community located in the historic cathedral city of Durham in the North-East of England, an area famed for its attractive countryside, coastline and cultural heritage. As well as its magnificent Cathedral and Castle, both World Heritage Sites, the city has other buildings of distinction and fine river banks which can be seen on foot in a few hours. Durham is three hours by train from London and Manchester, two hours from Edinburgh, and less than one hour from two regional airports, Newcastle International and Durham Tees Valley.</p>

<p>Credits and Course Load</p>	<p>The normal workload for a full-time student is 120 Durham credits per academic year. This normally equates to 6 modules per academic year at 20 credits each.</p> <p>Durham University has not adopted ECTS as credits system, however, Durham credits can be translated into ECTS as follows: Durham credits x 0.5 = ECTS. E.g. 20 Durham credits x 0.5 = 10 ECTS. While the ECTS handbooks will list ECTS credits, all other University publications will list Durham credits.</p>
<p>Language of Instruction</p>	<p>English</p>
<p>Important Information</p>	<p>Examinations: The academic year at Durham University follows a term system with 3 terms per year. Examinations are mostly held at the end of each academic year only. Special/ alternative assessment arrangements for Erasmus students coming for less than a year can usually be made with the individual departments.</p> <p>Durham University does presently not allocate ECTS credits to the individual academic terms as individual modules are designed to run over the full academic year (see Examinations). It is important for partner universities to define an appropriate credit load for their students for the duration they will spend in Durham. Partners will be provided with all the details relating to the academic work completed by a student for the duration of their studies at Durham</p>

	University in the Academic Transcript towards the end of each term and the official Transcript of Records will be sent to the partner universities in the Summer.

Accommodation	
On Campus Accommodation	<p>Durham University is a 'collegiate' university, i.e. the colleges provide the social context for students including accommodation. The university has a central accommodation office managing university residence halls/ dormitories.</p> <p>Erasmus students should refer to the ECTS handbook (part 1) for information on accommodation as accommodation options differ.</p> <p>Overseas Exchange students only: All overseas exchange students are guaranteed a place in one of the residential colleges of the University if they apply for the programme by the deadline.</p> <p>Students opt for college accommodation on the application form. While students can state preference we cannot guarantee their college choice but will certainly consider preferences when making college allocations. Students will be notified of their college in their offer letter. The college will then contact the student with further details prior to arrival.</p>
Off Campus Accommodation	<p>If a student does not wish to live in a college the Exchanges & Study Abroad team can be contacted for advice on private accommodation. Students will be responsible to organise private accommodation themselves. Offers are available through the Durham Student Union (DSU) Accommodation Office.</p>

Nearest Airport	Newcastle International is the largest airport closest to Durham University. Students can connect to Newcastle via London Heathrow and flights are frequent.

The service usually covers Newcastle International Airport and Durham Train Station and will provide transport for students to Queen's Campus, Stockton if required. Duration of Exchange	<p>Due to the structure of our modules, which are designed to run over a full academic year (Oct-Jun) per module, we strongly advise students to come for a full academic year (Oct - Jun) and follow normal assessment structures as set for modules and earn full credit points.</p> <p>Part year Erasmus study periods are possible only with the consent of the receiving department and provided that placements start in October (Michaelmas term). Starting an Erasmus study period in January (term 2) is only possible with special consent and should</p>

	<p>normally be confined to students undertaking project or research work in one of the departments. <i>Please consult the ECTS handbook for the relevant department for part-year study opportunities. Some restrict admission to students coming for the full academic year only.</i></p> <p>Please note that it is <u>not</u> possible to start in the Easter term (April - Jun), except by special arrangement for project /research work.</p>
