### General Academic Information

Established in 1911, UWA is Western Australia's oldest university and one of Australia's most prestigious educational institutions.

First-time visitors to the campus will find UWA's impressive architecture and beautifully landscaped gardens breathtaking. UWA's riverside campus, only minutes from the city centre offers an unrivalled study experience. Students have access to libraries, an extensive range of campus services, and excellent sports and recreational facilities to balance the demands of study. Activities include sports such as tennis, squash, basketball, volleyball and aerobics, general interest clubs and societies, cafes, theatres and museums.

The University of Western Australia (UWA) is recognised internationally as a leading university and in 2012 ranked 96th in the Academic Ranking of World Universities (ARWU) from the Shanghai Jiao Tong University. UWA is the only Western Australian university to belong to the prestigious [Group of Eight](#) – a coalition of the top research universities in Australia – and is one of only two Australian universities to belong to the [Worldwide Universities Network](#), a partnership of 18 research-led universities from Europe, North America, North Asia and Australia.

UWA's formal agreements with nearly 230 institutions (including over 130 Student Exchange Agreements) around the world provide a spirit of internationalism and promote a lively exchange of staff, students, knowledge and ideas. International exchange students will benefit not only from first class teaching but will also enjoy the beautiful campus at Crawley and its multi-cultural community which includes students from 90 different countries.

<b>Is pre-registration (enrolment) available? If not when does registration take place?</b>										
Pre-enrolment is not available at UWA, however classes do not normally fill up. Students may request pre-approval of units by completing a <b>Proposed Study List</b> in the online application. A UWA Academic Advisor will assess the proposed study plan for pre-requisites and other restrictions. An <b>Approved Study List</b> will then be emailed to the students prior to departure.  Formal enrolment takes place during Orientation. Students can seek academic advice during Orientation, and are able to receive additional approvals at this time. The add/drop period is open for the first 2 weeks of classes.

Students may apply for any unit which is part of a standard course of study except for courses within the <b>Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry</b> .  Other courses may be restricted and some units may also be quota restricted.

<b>Academic Requirements</b>										
<b>Undergraduate Students:</b> Completion of one year of tertiary study at a recognised institution at the time of application, with an overall weighted average equivalent to 65% on the UWA Grading Scale (normally a B grade or 3.0 on a 4 point GPA scale). Agreed equivalent is outlined within the Exchange Agreement.  <b>Postgraduate students:</b> Completion of a Bachelor's degree (or equivalent) in order to take classes at a postgraduate level. Access to MBA classes requires the completion of a Bachelor's degree plus students must demonstrate managerial experience (generally three years) in order to enrol in these units.  All students must satisfy UWA's standard English language competency requirements. See below.

Where the primary language of instruction at the home university is not English, Candidates for the exchange program to UWA must satisfy one of the standard English Language Competency (ELC) requirements set out in Table 1, or such other language proficiency requirements as specified in a formal Memorandum of Agreement. ## Application Information

### Application deadlines

**Semester 1 (Feb-June):** Nominations by 30 November, Application and Documents due by 31 December  
**Semester 2: (July-November):** Nominations by 1 April, Application and Documents due by 1 May  
 Late applications will be considered if there is enough processing time available.

### How to nominate your students

Exchange/Study Abroad partners are required to nominate to UWA **first**, and then students will receive an email with password and instructions for completing the online application. To nominate a student, please email the following details to the appropriate **Adviser**:-

### Supporting documents required

- All 3 pages of the Application Coversheet (printed from online application and **signed**)
- Proposed Study Plan (printed from online application if applicable)
- Evidence of English Language Competency, **signed and stamped by home university** (if applicable)

In some cases, if the GPA falls marginally below the minimum required, we will also request:-

- 2 x academic references
- 1 x statement of motivation
- 1 x letter of support from home university / international office



## Arrival / Orientation program

<b>Recommended arrival dates</b>
Your students should arrive a day or two before Orientation if housing has already been pre-arranged. Students who have not secured any housing are recommended to arrive at least two weeks prior to the commencement of classes.
<b>Airport Pick-Up</b>
A 24 hour airport pick-up service is available free of charge if you have applied for permanent or temporary housing in one of the University Residential Colleges, or if your final destination on arrival is within the university precinct (Nedlands, Crawley, Subiaco, Shenton Park or the Perth CBD). Students can apply for Airport pick-up and Temporary housing on OASYS once they have accepted their offer.
<b>Orientation Dates</b>
Semester 1, 2015 – will begin on Wednesday 11 February 2015 Semester 2, 2015 – will begin on Monday 20 <sup>th</sup> July 2015

Not applicable, however optional excursions will incur a small fee.

<b>Is university-administered accommodation available to exchange students?</b>

<b>Is accommodation guaranteed for exchange students?</b>
Housing at the colleges is NOT guaranteed and has become very competitive in recent years due to its popularity. Generally the Residential College's review applications on a case by case basis. The most important factor that influences a candidate's acceptance to a Residential College is the information that a future student provides. For example, the Colleges need to know students' personal & academic achievements; why they would like to reside at a Residential College; if they have any special needs; postgrad/undergrad; enrolled course; year/level of study etc. It is important to note that University Hall and St George's College favour full-year leases, so students applying for a full year will be given first priority. Semester length leases are offered when vacancies become available. <b>College Accommodation Application Process</b>

<b>If university-administered accommodation is not available, will there be any assistance in finding private housing?</b>
Students will be directed to the Housing Service of Student Services. The Housing Service offers a free and confidential accommodation advisory support service to enrolled students. Housing Officers do not arrange accommodation students but can only provide advice and information and manage the Housing Database, which is a self-serve facility allowing enrolled students to view property listings and make their selections accordingly. A number of properties (either on a vacant or share basis) and rooms available for rent in homes in surrounding areas are listed in the Housing Database. ## Visa requirements

<b>Are students required to obtain a student visa?</b>
Yes. Once students' return the signed acceptance contract with applicable payment, UWA will issue a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) document with will allow students to apply for an Australian Student Visa (ASV). UWA is an eligible institution for Streamlined Visa Processing. <b>Are students allowed to work?</b>
Students on an ASV can work up to 40 hours per fortnight during semester and unlimited hours during university holidays.
<b>Working Holiday Visa (WHV)</b>

If students come to UWA on a WHV they should be aware of the following:

Students are not entitled to Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) but must accept the responsibility to arrange their own health insurance and acknowledge that they must cover their own expenses while in Australia

Students will not be covered by the Education for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act which protects the interests of overseas students studying in Australia. Further information about how ESOS protects overseas students is available at:

## Medical Insurance

### Are international students required to purchase a compulsory plan?

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) is an Australian Student Visa requirement.

Students from Sweden (covered by CSN), Norway and Belgium do not have to purchase the additional insurance. New-Zealand and Australian citizens will be eligible for Medicare and do not require OSHC.

### Are students able to apply for an insurance waiver if they have their own insurance coverage?

No. OSHC is an Australian Government requirement.
