Winter Program Content

The program will run January 23 – February 11. Participants should plan to arrive in Edmonton on January 22 and to depart on February 12.

Housing

Students will live in off campus hostel accommodation and will be housed with 4 students per room.

Meals

Breakfast will be included each day. Students will be responsible for their own lunch and dinner daily and the hostel has facilities where students can cook their own meals. The estimated cost to students for meals is approximately \$500 for 3 weeks.

Health Insurance

<u>Health insurance is not included in the program fee.</u> The purchase of travelers' health insurance prior to your departure to Canada that is valid for the entire duration of your trip is strongly recommended.

Program Costs: The cost of the program is \$2500 (Canadian) per student. This fee includes:

- 13-day academic program will all instruction, arrangements and administrative support
- Airport pickup-drop off
- Accommodation (occupancy will be 4 students per room)
- Breakfast daily
- Field trips and activities (note that field trips and activities are subject to change without notice)

Universities sending 8 or more students will receive a special rate of \$2300 per student and the cost for cohorts of 15 or more will be \$2100 per student.

Academic Credit Transfer Information

The academic program will consist of a minimum of 30 contact hours with the opportunity to increase contact hours through classroom observation sessions and individual consultations with faculty members. A certificate of participation will be awarded to each participant. A letter confirming actual contact hours can be issued.

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
